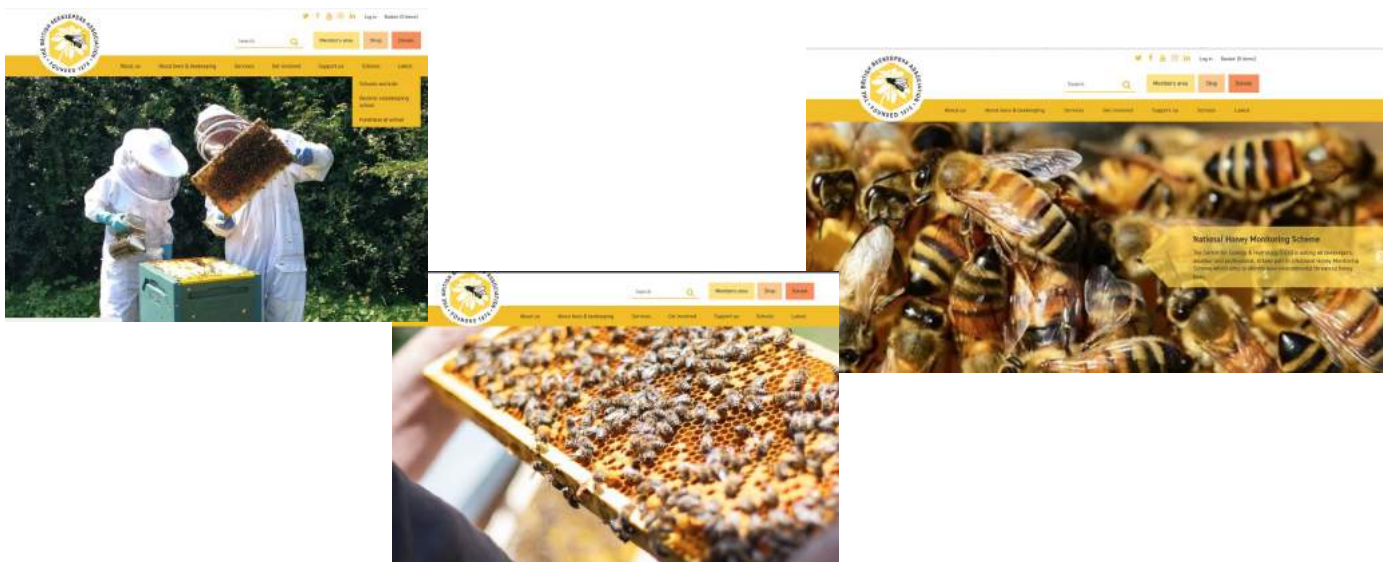

Melvyn's Missive



Chairman, Melvyn Essen, writes for the County News

I hope to see many of you at our Convention on Saturday 24th February. If the last few years are anything to go by it should be an excellent day.

It's a day that should appeal to beginners and to more experienced beekeepers. It's also a chance to speak to other members of other groups and if you haven't been to the Convention before give it a go. I'm sure you won't be disappointed and you may be inspired to try something new with your own bees this year.

Varroa control seems to create more and more problems - should we or shouldn't we treat? And if so, with what? And when? When you think you have a happy medium you find your preferred treatment could be more harmful to bees (and to you) than you thought! I'm referring to the use of vaporized Oxalic acid - something I was reluctant to do. Is it safe for the bees and for us? However, it seems to work and perhaps it's better than using a pesticide like Apitraz. Let's hope research like the ReViVe project will come up with a new understanding and a new way of managing *Varroa*.

Remembering John Stevens



*John Stevens, Life Member and Past President
of Chichester Beekeepers*

In the last newsletter we reported the sad passing of John Stevens, in early December.

John spent his working life organising exhibitions and major events in the UK and overseas, including managing Earls Court and Olympia and for 12 years running exhibitions in Dubai. He and Christine met in 1984 when they were both attending a residential course with the Institute of Marketing. They shared a love of cars and aeroplanes and also of travel.

John moved to West Sussex, from his long time home in Chelmsford, in 1994 whilst Christine was house-sitting Molecomb House, on the Goodwood Estate. He had always had an interest in keeping bees and when a member of Chichester Beekeepers, Michael Horne, asked if he could put a hive of bees on the Molecomb lawn, John immediately agreed on the basis that he could 'look over Michael's shoulder' and learn something about beekeeping.

At the end of that summer Michael offered to give John the bees if he bought himself a hive, and suggested he attend classes to learn about beekeeping. John had caught the beekeeping bug and although the original colony did not survive the winter, and they moved from Molecomb to Tangmere, he quickly acquired some more bees and he and Christine attended classes to learn how to care for them.

They were persuaded to join the committee of Chichester Beekeepers and towards the end of 2000 John took over the Chairmanship and continued in that role the following year. By this time they were running 12 or more hives. John and Christine gave up paid employment in 2002 and became almost full time beekeepers producing and selling large amounts of honey.

They were also the Chichester representatives on the Executive of West Sussex Beekeepers and in an effort to increase public interest in honey and to raise the standards of honey production by local beekeepers, John created and organised the West Sussex Honey Festival which took place at Manor Nursery at Runcton. The association took over a whole section of the nursery, members of the different divisions manned displays of beekeeping related information and activities, there was a honey show with conventional classes and also more 'accessible' ones aimed at achieving high levels of presentation and taste – this was judged by a commercial food buyer. In addition they made and sold freshly made pancakes with honey as well as fresh raspberries with local honey and organic cream. The Festival attracted entries from more than 80 beekeepers, sold large amounts of honey to the 2000 or more visitors it attracted over the two days it ran in each of the years 2003, 2004 and 2005. The amount of work involved in organising the event was enormous and when John stepped down from organising it the event ceased.

In 2006 the Chichester Division was struggling with numbers and a sense of direction, and beekeeping was declining nationally. John was persuaded to take on the role of President, which he did on condition that he could address the need for good communications, regular meetings and a training function. He started to produce a regular newsletter and he and Christine were persuaded that they were the most appropriate people to run some training courses. Accordingly he wrote the training course notes, from which Christine produced power point presentations and they ran their first course in 2008.

The timing coincided with the increased publicity about beekeeping and over the years of his Presidency the membership increased from less than 50 to over 150. At the same time they were running around 40 colonies including a dedicated training apiary. Sadly they had both become allergic to bee venom. They spent three years on a desensitisation programme at Southampton Hospital, but the positive effects of this wore off and anaphylaxis again became a problem, so after rather too many visits to A&E they reluctantly gave up active beekeeping at the end of 2009. They continued the classroom part of the training course until the end of the 2012 course with Norman Dingemans providing the training apiary, originally at his own apiary and then at Aldingbourne.

In recognition of his enormous contribution to the Division, John was made a Life member of Chichester Beekeepers in 2015.

John will be sadly missed by his many beekeeping friends in the county.

Swarm Collectors 2018

The BBKA will shortly be collating its Swarm Collectors' List for the coming season. So if you believe you have the necessary experience, are able to take swarms within a 10 mile radius of your postcode and are prepared to remain on the list for the season please speak to your Division's committee members. Your Division must endorse your application and will provide a list of its approved members to the BBKA. Your details will then be entered onto the Association's website for the swarm collecting season.



Please note that you may not accept payment for this service other than out-of-pocket expenses or sell on the swarm to a third party. To do so will invalidate your BBKA insurance.
